Best Practice 01

1) Title of the Best Practice:-

‘Decreasing Drop-Out Rate of Married Girl Students’

2) Objective of the Practice:-

- To bring them into main stream of education
- To decrease the drop-out rate of girl student
- To create awareness regarding importance of education among the society.
- To empower the married women.

3) The Context:-

It is noticed that the age of marriage of girls are comparatively less in rural area than urban area. Farmers marry their daughters at early age – almost at the age of 18 or after completion of 12th Std. They are unwilling to give them higher education. Instead of giving them higher education they marry their daughters at the earliest. Some farmers marry their daughters before completion of three years degree program. Therefore, we try our best to bring them into main stream of higher education.

4) The Practice:-

The faculty of the college collects the information of such girl from other students at the beginning of academic year and about our students who have left the college before completing three years degree program. Our faculty gets all necessary details about such girls, their husbands and their in-laws. We visit these families and try to know the reasons and difficulties regarding unwillingness to send their daughters-in-law to the college. After interaction with them, we learn that they are not interested in giving them higher education. Our faculty persuades their mind and convinces them the importance of higher education. Thus we bring them into main stream of education.

5) Evidence of success:-

The faculty tried their best to bring maximum married girl students into main stream of higher education. Since academic year 2012-13 the faculty has succeeded in persuading the minds of husbands and -in-laws of married girls. We succeed in bringing 12-15 married girl students in stream of education every year. The faculty succeed in bringing 12 married girl students in main stream of higher education during this academic year. Thus we succeed in lessening the dropout rate of married girl students.

6) Problems Encountered and Resources Required:-

The problem encountered regarding to convince husbands and -in-laws of married girl students that their thoughts are traditional; they are not willing to send their daughters-in-law to the college; they do not give more importance to higher education. They are also of the view that there are no jobs opportunities after getting higher education. The Problems encountered are also related to financial assistance to certain extent. The faculty provides financial support for this practice. The faculty has to bear expenses of visits to their villages to convince them.

Best Practice 02

1) Title of the Best Practice:-

Water Management in Drought Prone Area

2) Objective of the Practice:-

- To create awareness among the students about the scarcity of water
- To create awareness regarding importance of water in human life.
- To create awareness regarding importance of water management in drought prone area.
- To develop skill of water management.
- To create job opportunities for the students.

3) The Context:-

Arts and commerce college, Pusegaon was established in 1994 by Rayat Shikshan Sanstha, Satara in drought prone area of Satara District. The scarcity of water has been increasing since 2002. People of this area experienced severe drought during 2002 to 2005. At that time, drinking water for people and water and fodder for cattle were not available in this region. People had to depend on tankers for drinking water. Fodder and drinking water for cattle were made available in fodder camp by the Government. After that scarcity of water has been gradually increasing every year in this area. Hence the institute decides to create awareness regarding water management among the students and society.

4) The Practice:-

The college organizes various activities on water management. The institute organizes lectures of

experts to create awareness regarding water management among the students first. Then rallies of students along with slogans and banners are organized to create awareness among the society in nearby villages since 2012. The institute in collaboration with Satyamev Jayate Pani Foundation (Satyamev Jayate Water Cup Foundation) has been working in this field since last two years. The institution in collaboration with Satyamev Jayate Pani Foundation (Water Cup Foundation) organizes lectures and workshops for students, their parents and farmers in the college. Audio-visual clips are shown to create awareness and motivate them for water conservation and water management. Then our faculty guides the students to create awareness among villagers.

5) Evidence of success:-

The students of our institute raise the issue of water management and conservation in villagers' meetings (Gramsabha) and motivate villagers to undertake the work of percolation of rainwater and increasing the storage capacity of rainwater by digging pitch, widening river beds and constructing dams in their respective villages. Many nearby villages undertake the work of water management without any fund from the government. It is noticed that water level of earth has been gradually increasing in many villages due to work of water management. Now the problem of drinking water is not as severe as past and it is solved in some extent.

6) Problems Encountered and Resources Required:-

At the early stage, there was no response from villagers. They think that it is the responsibility of the government to make water available during summer season. So we have to visit these villages many times to create awareness among them. The faculty has to bear expenses of visits to these villages to convince them.
